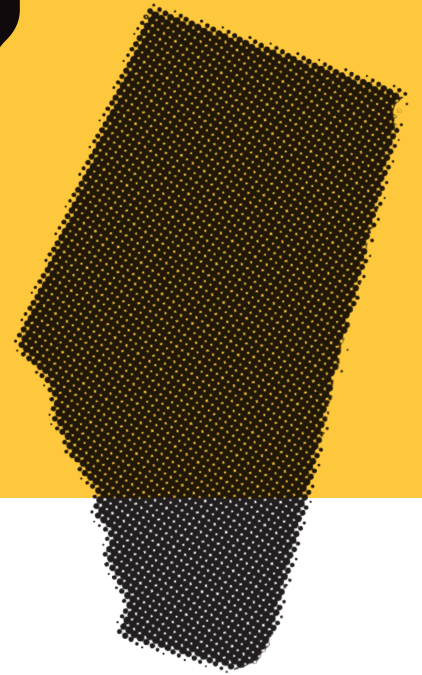


IT'S BETTER HERE?

LIVING AND WORKING IN ALBERTA IS NO LONGER THE ADVANTAGE IT ONCE WAS.

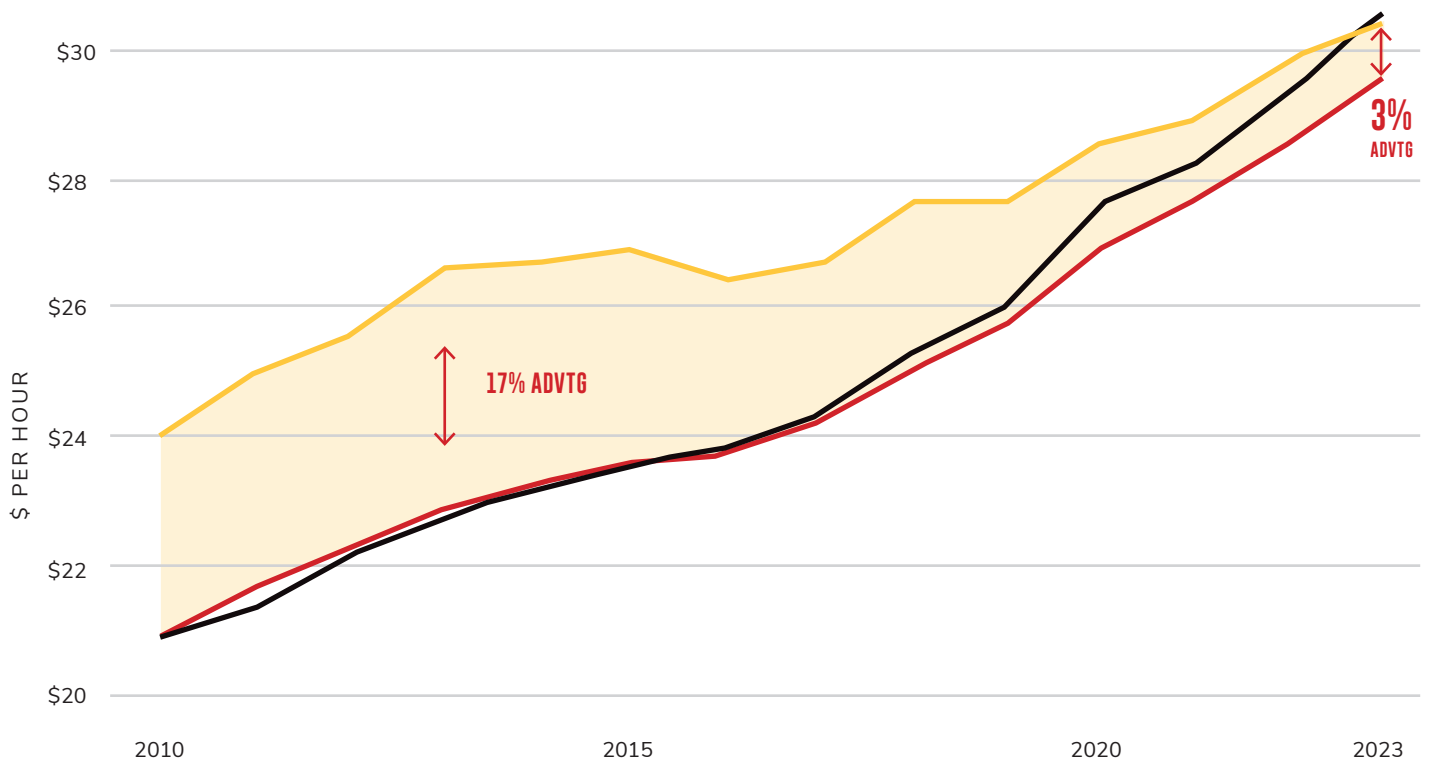
Alberta's teachers face increasing pressures, working in the least funded (per student) education system in the country, while wages fail to keep pace with inflation and other provinces.



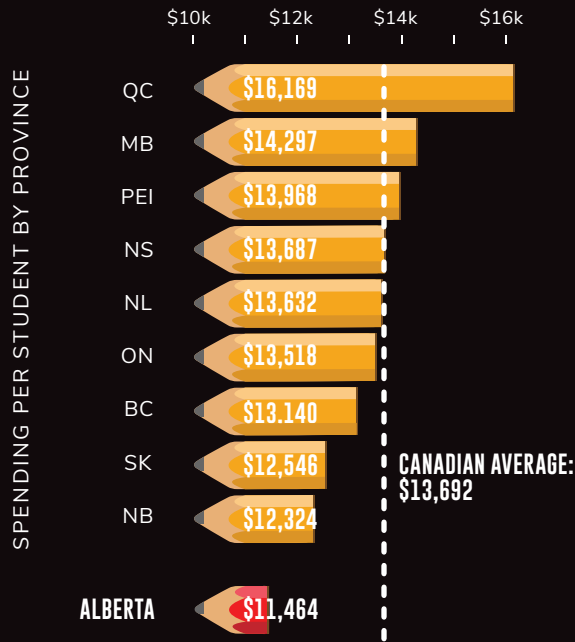
OUR DISAPPEARING "ADVANTAGE"

Over the past five years, Alberta's wages have grown **more slowly** than anywhere else in Canada. Alberta's previous 17% wage advantage over the rest of Canada has dropped to just 3% in 2023, with British Columbia now **surpassing Alberta**.

- Canada average



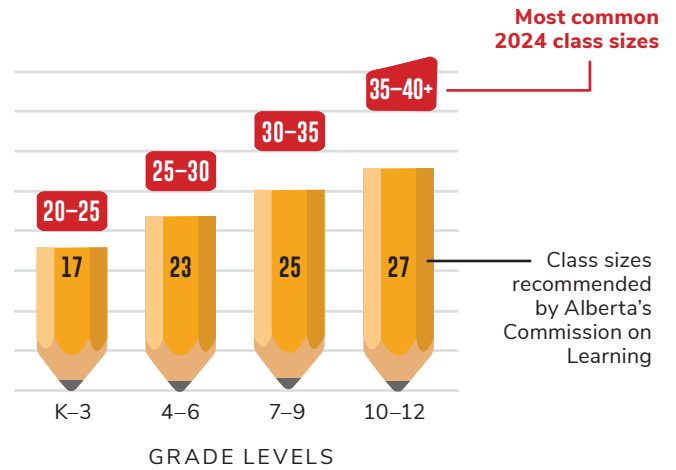
ALBERTA IS THE RICHEST PROVINCE, YET WE SPEND THE LEAST ON EDUCATION
